


Note from the Moderator - Bob McLendon

Sheila's parents modeled volunteerism: her dad as a Scoutmaster, her mom as a very active church secretary. Throughout her 31-year career in public education and post-retirement employment with her hometown's Chamber of Commerce, Sheila had MANY fun part-time jobs (wine consultant, events staffer, "Information Lady" at the local mall, etc.), She was active in statewide professional educators' groups, and served on the Board for a non-profit Arboretum/Nature's Classroom near her home in Virginia. She moved to Flat Rock in 2012 and quickly became involved in local activities, serving on the Board of Directors for the Blue Ridge Center for Lifelong Learning at Blue Ridge Community College for several years, and, since 2018, has volunteered on the Leads Team of the Progressive Alliance of Henderson County. Other involvements include the League of Women Voters, (former) Bee City USA Hendersonville Leadership, Public School Strong NC, the Henderson County Democratic Party, and the Orchard of Flat Rock neighborhood's Hunger Walk 2023 campaign.

It was at one of the BRCLL classes at Blue Ridge that Sheila first learned about FCC's Ashley Lecture Series, which was her introduction to our congregation and its many opportunities for service and personal growth. Her involvement here has been deeply enriching, especially with the (former) Compassionate Action, Service and Giving, and the Peace Building and Justice groups. Just before and during the Covid era, she and several others, including Charley and Pam Rogers, Bob McLendon and Karla at FCC launched a group aimed at finding ways to heal the festering divisions in our nation, called "Live the Golden Rule WNC". You may have heard Sheila say: "I have no children. I don't cook, nor clean my house (much). I have no pets other than dust bunnies. What else would I do with my time other than pay attention, keep learning, and contribute as best I can to my community?"

EFFORTS TO BE GOOD STEWARDS OF THE FCC ENVIRONMENT

The volunteers of MPR take pride in caring for our gardens & building. We try as much as possible to be environmentally conscious. Here are some things that we do:

- Thermostats are lowered when rooms are not in use.
- Recycle donated aluminum cans. Donation bin is located outside near back door of FCC.
- Scrap Metal Recycling such as metal fence posts, chicken wire, metal grates, metal rails, empty propane tanks & old water heaters. Contact Milton Stewart for questions.
- Compost bins are located in our vegetable garden. Another compost container is located in kitchen. We accept grass clippings, fruit & p; vegetable scraps, coffee grounds & egg shells.
- No longer buying polystyrene foam or plastic cups & plates for Kitchen.
- Using only sustainable cups or paper. Will start to use compostable utensils when current stock is depleted.
- Water our vegetable garden & Labyrinth with water from 2 natural springs on our property and use no chemical pesticides in vegetable garden.
- Have a rain barrel in vegetable garden & Atrium.

MPR thanks you for your donations! The funds received from recycling are used for garden supplies, seeds & plants.




