This is a vibrant time in the life of our church, and it is exciting to see how we are growing and strengthening our ministry within and outside of our walls. Here are just a few of the things that are percolating:

- The Finance Ministry and Council has approved live streaming for our services. Expenses for this service are being funded by the Memorial Fund for Cary Battle and the Property Maintenance Fund. Our sincere thanks to Bob Battle, his family and all who contributed to the Memorial.
- We have interior designs (thanks to Mark Mitchell) to expand and renovate our Sunday School area.
- We have architectural plans completed (thanks to Ken Harkin) for much needed renovation to our restrooms.
- Our By-Laws Committee chaired by Bill Shaffer has completed its work and presented updates recommended to Council on August 26th. In September, Council will vote on the updates and then the updated by-laws will be presented for a congregational vote in October
- New signage has been designed by Stephanie Lowder for the parking lot and entrance to church. You will see these signs slowly rolling out around our campus.
- Our garden team, led by Milton Stewart has provided close to 2,000 pounds of fresh produce to IAM and other food ministries in Henderson County.
- Phil Taylor our Treasurer reports that as of 7/31/2025 our Church Operating Fund is \$29,637 better than budgeted and our Heritage Fund year to date has gained \$39,639 and the total is \$668,978,



Service & Giving Update



Highlights - August 2025

At the August 14 Service & Giving (S&G) meeting, the team allocated funds to seven 'inclusivity' agencies and we welcome all to our September 11 meeting where we will discuss funding for food-insecure and homeless groups.

The team discussed the successful **school supplies** drive for Upward Elementary. The entire school staff was overwhelmed and appreciative.

The **Hunger Walk, September 20**, details were reported on. Donation envelopes will be available each Sunday. Donations may be made from non-walkers, not just participants.

The team discussed the Circles USA program and agreed more information on this possible new non-profit is necessary.

Save a Life Day is scheduled for **September 25** at Jackson Park Shelter 1, also known as **Free Naloxone Day**, and is a day to bring awareness to overdose and how harm reduction techniques such as Naloxone can help reduce overdose deaths in our community.

Revised **Church Bylaws** are being finalized and will be voted on by congregation in September. Soon all of our services will be live streamed. The environmental work (retention pond and stream) is moving forward.

The next S&G meeting is **Thursday**, **September 11** at **10 am** in the Choir Room. As ever, all are welcome.




Thank you, JOHN PAVLOVITZ!

He conveyed that we don't have to - in fact we can't, work at maximum on all the many issues that pain us but suggested that we pick one, become an expert on that issue, and do good work to advance the common good there.

Clearly, we have been a major contributor to the success of this fundraising event, and we intend to do so again this year.
