First Congregational Bylaws

If you didn't realize, our church has a set of Bylaws that guide how we operate. Periodically we review these and update them to reflect who the church is and what we envision the church becoming. For most of the past year a diligent group of Congregants, along with our Moderator and our Pastor has been meeting, reviewing, discussing and making suggestions about our Bylaws. The group's final product was presented to the church Council and, after a bit more tweaking, was approved in September. Now it's your turn. On November 16th, after service, we'll have a congregational meeting to review and vote on the proposed updates. I know it sounds boring, but it is important. At the meeting I'll explain how our church operates, what the bylaws do and why we've proposed some updates. Prior to the meeting we'll have paper copies of the proposed Bylaws with a summary of the changes on the table in the "holy hall" and we'll send everyone an email link. Please plan to stay and be part of the First Congregational family meeting on November 16th.



Stewardship Season is a happy time at First Congregational (unlike some places, where it is seen as a chore). It's a time when we can review with joy our giving and accomplishments ofthe past year. And it's a time for us to reflect on the future, and how we can help keep on projecting our values within our church and into our community.

In late October, we mailed the Stewardship package to all our member units(we hope!). If yours doesn't arrive in the next few days, please call the office and we'll get one to you. The campaign will run through the first three weeks in November, culminating in a service of thanksgiving and stewardship gratitude on November 23rd.

Immigration & Citizenship: Where We Are Now & How We Got Here

The Henderson County League of Women Voters is hosting a program on "Immigration & Citizenship: Where We Are Now & How We Got Here" on Tuesday, November 18 from 5:00-6:30 pm at the Henderson County Public Library, Kaplan Auditorium, 301 N. Washington St., Hendersonville, NC.

Dr. Giovanny Pleites-Hernandez, Assistant Professor of Political Science at UNC Asheville, will go beyond current headlines and discuss immigration and citizenship policy within its historical context. He'll consider the question of what it means to be an 'American,' and does 'American-ness' differ from other national identities?

Professor Pleites-Hernandez studies minority politics, public opinion, and Congress. He researches and teaches on a number of topics including, media and politics, public policy and administration, and immigration politics and policy in the U.S.
